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Glenside Streetscape Enhancements

The Easton Road Streetscape and Traffic Calming Enhancement Project is nearly done. The third and final phase of the project, which targeted Easton Road between Springhouse Lane and Limekiln Pike, should be completed by mid fall.

Similar to the Wesley Plaza transformation that preceded it, Easton Road improvements include decorative streetlights, embossed crosswalks, new traffic lights, granite curbs, stamped concrete sidewalks, attractive refuse and recycling containers, pedestrian benches and traffic-calming measures in Downtown Glenside from Arcadia University to the Glenside Train Station. Over \$3

million in state and county grants provided most of the funding for the four-year project.

In addition, banners and way-finding signs enhance the commercial district. Both attractive and practical, the directional signs point drivers and pedestrians to local sites of interest, while “Downtown Glenside” banners help establish a sense of the district’s identity. District identification signs also grace four other commercial districts in the Township: Cheltenham Village, East Cheltenham Avenue, Elkins Park East and Elkins Park West.

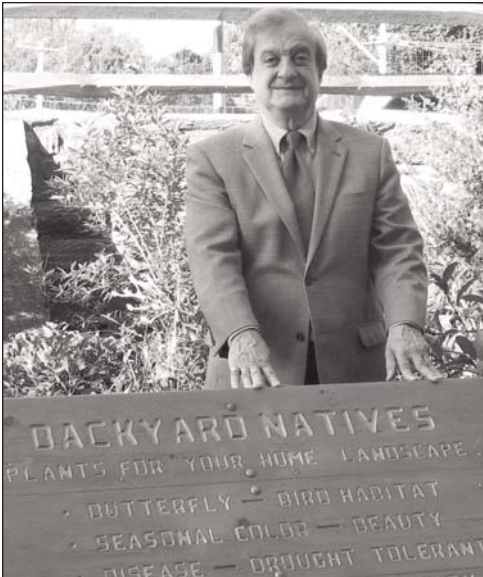
Together these improvements are key components of the Township’s Commercial District

Enhancement Plan, a strategy for economic development. Such enhancements help attract both shoppers and new businesses, which bolsters a thriving business district. A healthy business base, in turn, supports a healthy community by minimizing reliance on the residential tax base.

In fact, the Glenside streetscape enhancements have already helped attract several

Dear Neighbors:

As always, the Township is buzzing with activity. In addition to every departments' rigorous, daily workload, three major endeavors are ready to finish, about to start or somewhere in the middle.

Streetscape Enhancements

The Easton Road Commercial District Streetscape Enhancements are nearly done. Like the earlier transformation of a block of Wesley Avenue into Wesley Plaza, the Easton Road makeover features decorative streetlights, hanging flower baskets, embossed crosswalks, pedestrian benches and much more. The enhancements, which stretch from the Glenside Train Station to Arcadia University, will be completed this fall. The Township secured over \$3 million in state and county grants to fund the majority of the work.

Elkins Park East and West Commercial Districts are slated for enhancements next. Design and construction plans – incorporating input from local residents, businesses and other stakeholders – are already finished for Elkins Park East. The Township is actively pursuing grants to start construction. In fact, State

Senator LeAnna Washington recently announced a \$500,000 Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program Grant for the project, but funding is pending release by Governor Corbett.

Fortunately, a number of businesses have already opened recently in the Elkins Park East area near the train station, including Yo Dogs, a hot dog and casual food emporium, the Joyful Art Boutique and The Market at Elkins Park Station. In addition, the Creekside Co-op Farmers' Market is back at High School Park on Sundays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Creekside Co-op also has recently made great strides in connection with acquiring the Ashbourne Market property, financing and construction. It still faces important hurdles, including securing a bridge loan for acquisition and construction and raising at least \$250,000 in member loans, but its latest progress is impressive and promising.

Meanwhile, community meetings to craft streetscape design plans for Elkins Park West, the commercial district near the Church and Old York Roads intersections, should get underway later this year. The plan should be completed by spring 2012.

Sustainability

This summer we launched a major new initiative to ensure the Township thrives long into the future. A Sustainability Committee, consisting of over 40 members, will develop a plan to foster community sustainability covering five major topics: energy, mobility, land use, waste management and quality of life. The concept is an extension of the Township's many past "green" efforts, including the Township's Environmental Advisory Council and numerous awards for good environmental practices. Sanitary Sewers

The Township continues to rehabilitate its aging sanitary sewer system, a task that will take several more years to complete.

I'm happy to report the bypass pumping system installed last year between Wall Park and Tookany Creek Parkway is working as designed. An interim solution to prevent sewage overflows during wet weather events, the bypass pumps excess flow through sealed pipes from an overloaded sewer section to another area of the main line that can accommodate it. The Township planted greenery to help camouflage

the three miles of pipe, which must remain in place until the sewer rehabilitation is completed. In addition, Ogontz Field has also been restored.

Meanwhile, small sections of damaged pipe or manholes have been repaired in five locations, and 41 groundwater monitor wells have been installed to track water table levels. This summer contractors began lining nearly 33,000 feet of sewer pipe in Elkins Park. Future projects include relining more pipe, possible replacement of interceptors and relocation of a section of shallow, damaged sewer beneath the Tookany Creek at Rices Mill Road.

Finally, most of the activities described here involve substantial volunteer work. This is one reason Cheltenham is great. Thank you all so much. Keep up the good work and stay involved.

Twinning Fingerpost

In May the Twinning Committee erected a stunning blue and gold fingerpost that points to the Township's twin city, Cheltenham, UK – and five “cousin” Cheltenham with ties to Cheltenham, UK – near the entrance of the Township Administration Building. The committee, which raised all funds for the fingerpost, hopes it will promote awareness of its mission to foster cultural, social and fraternal exchanges between the two communities.

Cheltenham, US, and Cheltenham, UK, share an historic link since the Township took its name from this English town. The two have enjoyed a long-standing bond of friendship that dates back about 60 years. In 2002 the Board of Commissioners established the Twinning Committee to strengthen that bond. This connection was formalized with the joint signing of the official Twinning Charters in 2003.

Exchanges and Links

Over the years officials have exchanged periodic visits, as have ordinary citizens. For example, in 2009 the Cheltenham (US) High School Lacrosse Team invited the Cheltenham (UK) Ladies' Lacrosse Team here to stay at team members' homes. In 2002, a contingent of UK Councillors delivered a “Book of Condolence” relating to the 9/11 tragedy, while Township officials later attended the Queen's Golden Jubilee festivities.

The Twinning Committee also promotes links between US and UK counterparts. For example, The Gym in Elkins Park enjoys a friendly rivalry with the Leisure@cheltenham gym in UK. The Gym won the Race Across the Atlantic in 2009, calculated by tallying miles racked up by participants on specific equipment. However, the UK gym won the weight-loss competition in 2010. This year's contest decides which gym gets permanent possession of the winner's plaque.

E-penpal links between school classes or individuals are also popular.

Fund-Raiser

To raise money for special projects and support exchanges and links, the Twinning Committee conducts an annual fund-raiser based on the Pennsylvania Lottery Daily Number. Each \$20 Twinning ticket is eligible to win 365 days in the calendar year, regardless of when the ticket was purchased within that year. Payouts are \$100 once a month, \$50 on Saturdays and \$25 all other days. Checks are automatically mailed to winning ticket holders each month.

Twinning lottery tickets may be purchased at the Township Administration Building, located at 8230 Old York Road in Elkins Park, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. □

1. Township residents have priority for all programs. Non-residents are eligible to register for only certain programs and at higher fees, as indicated by the "NR" amounts.
2. Registrations are accepted in the order in which they are received (except non-residents).
3. Register in person; registrations are not accepted by telephone, mail or email.
4. Refunds or adjustments will not be made for missed classes or for individuals who discontinue a class.
5. Refunds will be issued if a program is canceled or the class is full.
6. No refunds will be made in cases of falsified information.
7. An extra \$5 fee will be charged for all late registrations.
8. Please remember, separate checks are required for swim lessons.

Proxy Registration Policy

Someone other than a parent – a proxy – will be allowed to register a child for a program, **providing all of the following conditions are met:**

1. The parent must complete and sign a registration form in front of a Parks and Recreation staff member at one of our community centers during the week preceding the first registration day. The signed form can then be given to the proxy for registration and must be accompanied by the correct registration fee.
2. Proxies may register children from only one family besides their own.
3. A child registered by proxy must have a completed registration form for each class.
4. The proxy must wait in the regular registration lines to register the child. If the class reaches maximum capacity before the proxy can register the child, the child will not be allowed in that particular class. The proxy will not be allowed to register the child in another program/class without the parent's prior written consent for that program/class. Therefore, parents should consider completing more than one consent form.
5. If any of the above guidelines are violated, the registration by proxy will not be allowed.

Winter Class Closings

On days when Cheltenham public schools close due to holidays or inclement weather, programs and classes will not be held. Listen to KYW radio for school closing number 306, check the Township website www.cheltenhamtownship.org, watch Channel 42 (Comcast) or sign up via the website to get E-Notifications emailed to you. Postponed classes will be made up at the end of the program.

Creating Sustainability

“Development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs,” is one widely used definition of sustainability, coined by the United Nation’s World Commission on Environment and Development in 1987. Since then, the idea has taken root, inspiring many to work to ensure that the world left to their children and grandchildren will still be able to provide them with sustenance, shelter and economic opportunity.

Sustainability’s more immediate benefits include financial savings as a result of greater energy-efficiency, improved public health thanks to reduced greenhouse gases and a stronger sense of community. A formal sustainability plan will also help the Township acquire grant funding.

Sustainable Cheltenham

Cheltenham Township has taken up this challenge at a local level with the creation of a Sustainability Committee. Its mission is to devise a roadmap for the Township to foster sustainability in its own actions and promote “green” practices among the residents and businesses in the community.

The committee encompasses residents and other stakeholders, such as the School District, Arcadia University, Environmental Advisory Council, Einstein at Elkins Park/Moss Rehab Hospital and other community-based groups. Working with a Montgomery County Planning Commission consultant team, the committee will craft a comprehensive, Township-wide plan covering a range of issues, including energy use, mobility, land use, waste management and community/quality of life.

The first committee meeting in June established a two-year project timeline. Phase 2 will target inventory and analysis of existing conditions. Phase 3 entails visioning and goal setting. Developing specific objectives and recommendations in Phase 4 is expected to require the most time. Finally, an action plan devised in Phase 5 will be followed by the final plan design and review in Phase 6 in early 2013. The process will include public informational meetings.

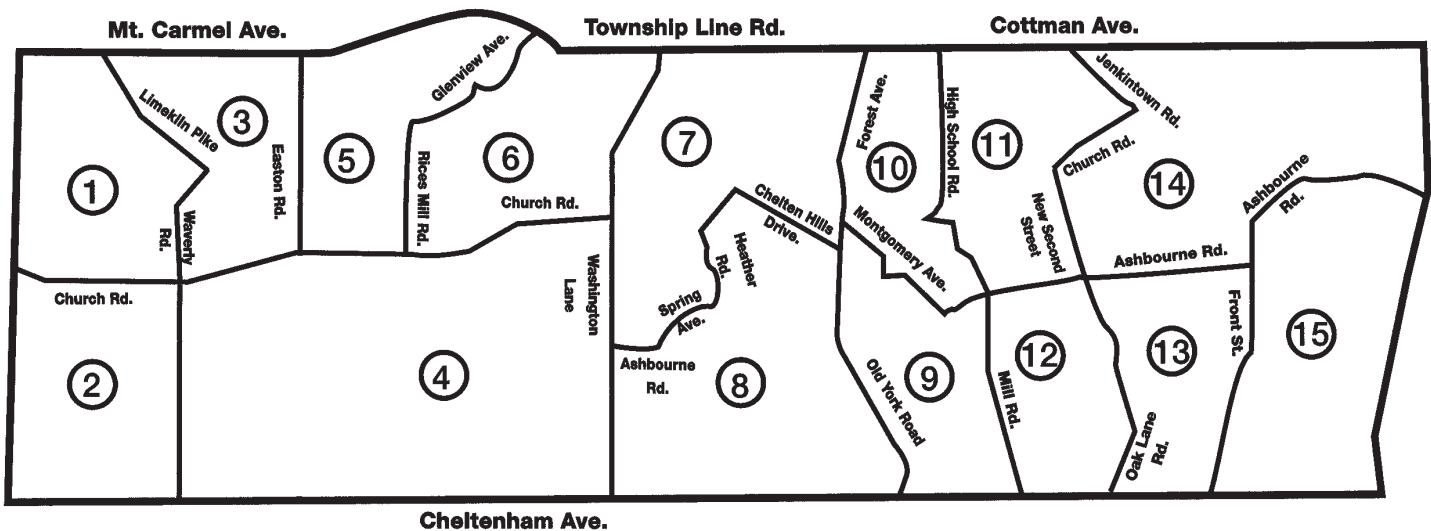

2010-11 Grants and Donations

The Township constantly pursues grants and corporate funding to benefit local programs and services. Despite a challenging economy, Cheltenham garnered over \$1,315,000 since August 2010:

- Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program Grant for the Elkins Park East Streetscape and Transportation Enhancement Project (pending Governor’s release of funds).
- \$237,148 Montgomery County Community Revitalization Grant for pedestrian street lights in La Mott.
- \$190,000 Montgomery County Open Space Grant for streambank stabilization at Ralph Morgan Park.
- \$155,000 additional funds from the Pennsylvania Community Transportation Initiative for Easton Road Streetscape Enhancements, Phase 3.
- \$60,645 Department of Environmental Protection Recycling Performance Grant for residential and commercial recycling in 2009.
- \$52,405 Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) H2O Grant for infiltration and inflow remediation of sanitary sewers, Phase 5.
- \$25,000 DCED Community Revitalization Assistance Project Grant for Easton Road Streetscape Enhancements, Phase 3.
- \$14,895 Justice Assistance Grant for four police mobile data computers and the online *CrimeReport.com* service.
- \$12,500 Commonwealth of Libraries Grant to upgrade lighting at Glenside Library.
- \$12,313 Tree Vitalize Grant to restore a section of riparian buffer in Parkview Park.
- \$12,000 Einstein at Elkins Park/Moss Rehab donation for the 2011 summer concerts.
- \$10,000 Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission Grant for an historic preservation consultant for the Wyncote Board of Historical and Architectural Review.
- \$8,494 Tree Vitalize Grant in conjunction with the Tookany/Tacony-Frankford Watershed to restore a portion of riparian buffer along the Rock Creek tributary.
- \$7,500 PECO Green Region Grant for an Arcadia Trail Connection.
- \$6,612 Bulletproof Vest Partnership to match the cost to replace 10 police vests.
- \$4,693.88 Community Development Block Grant for street improvements in Lynnewood Gardens.
- \$2,764.40 in PECO rebates for lighting upgrades in Township facilities.
- \$2,400 in donations for the 2010 Community Harvest Festival: Citizens Bank, C.S. McKee, Glenside Pub and The Hartford.
- \$500 Jenkinstown Lyceum Grant for Historical Commission lectures.
- \$500 PECO donation for a 2010 Glenside Street Fair band. □

2011 Fall Leaf Collection Program



The Township's 2011 Fall Leaf Collection Program will begin on Monday, October 17 in Route 6. The map above identifies the 15 designated routes.

The program begins in mid-October to allow enough time for five collections – two for loose leaves and three for bagged leaves – in every route before winter weather arrives. Leaf vacuums are ineffective in snow or ice. Early in the program, collection crews may proceed to some routes ahead of schedule. *However, each morning crews will return to the route scheduled for collection that day.*

After the regular program is completed, the Township will consider additional loose-leaf collections for the first few routes in the schedule, depending upon weather conditions and leaf volume. Announcements about any special third collections will be posted with signs in the affected routes and listed on www.cheltenhamtownship.org and Channel 42 (Comcast).

Residents may also drop off biodegradable paper bags containing leaves, twigs, grass clippings or garden debris at the Waverly Road Compost Facility, located on Waverly Road between Church Road and Cheltenham Avenue in Laverock, on weekdays between 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., unless affected by a holiday. No drop-offs are permitted when the facility is closed.

State law mandates that these materials be recycled, so Township crews will not accept them with household refuse. Large branches require a special collection, which entails a fee. However,

special branch collections will not be scheduled during the Fall Leaf Collection Program.

Please follow these guidelines and the schedules detailed on the next page for the most efficient collection program.

Loose Leaves

- Rake leaves to the curb no more than 14 days prior to the scheduled collection day, in accordance with Township Ordinance. Violators are subject to fines.
- Rake only leaves; do not include twigs or branches, which may jam leaf machines.
- Do not put leaves into the street immediately after a collection.

Note: The collection schedule is subject to weather delays. Check www.cheltenhamtownship.org or Channel 42 for the latest schedule information or call 215-887-6200, ext. 330.

Bagged Leaves

- Use biodegradable paper bags *only*. Bags are sold for 35 cents each or three for \$1 at the Township Administration Building, libraries and community centers.
- Put bagged leaves at the curb *just prior* to their scheduled collection day.
- Do not put trash, large branches, stones or rocks into the biodegradable paper bags. However, grass clippings, twigs and garden debris may always be included in the bags.

Additional Guidelines

- Never discard leaves, grass, twigs, branches or garden debris with household refuse.

- Have landscapers coordinate with the collection schedules.
- Do not park over leaves since heat from a vehicle could ignite them.
- Never burn leaves or place leaves at the curb anytime after the final collection, as stipulated by Township Ordinances. □

Cheltenham Joins America in Bloom

The Township has joined America in Bloom (AIB), a national community-development program that fosters civic pride and economic development. AIB coaches towns on ways to become more livable and sustainable through a framework of grass-roots efforts.

AIB judges visited the Township in August to evaluate it according to eight categories:

- Community involvement
- Tidiness
- Environmental awareness
- Heritage preservation
- Landscaped areas
- Floral displays
- Urban forestry
- Turf and groundcover areas.

The two-day visit featured tours of the community, including stops at Curtis Hall and Arboretum, Arcadia University/Grey Towers Castle, Richard Wall House Museum, Beth Sholom Synagogue, Myers Elementary School, High School Park, Downtown Glenside, La Mott Community Center, Robinson Park, Kleinheinz Pond, J.C. Melrose Country Club, Glenside Fire Company and La Mott Community Garden, to name just a few. The judges' feedback will help the Township design its AIB campaign, "Cheltenham



Charm." Ultimately, the Township intends to compete for nationally prestigious AIB awards and grants.

The Economic Development Task Force, partnering with the Environmental Advisory Council, the Friends of High School Park and other community groups, will continue to spearhead Cheltenham Charm as a beautification effort that enhances the Township's livability and appeal. An AIB kickoff project has already beautified eight Township park entrances with new plantings of native perennials that are deer-resistant, low-maintenance and long-blooming with at least three seasons of interest.

new businesses and sparked the creation of the Downtown Glenside Community Partnership, a coalition of local businesses that works with the Township to present promotional events such as First Fridays, Glenside Bike Nite and the Glenside Street Fair.

What's Next

The Township is already using completed streetscape enhancement plans to apply for grants for Elkins Park East – the district near the Elkins Park Train Station. Meanwhile, design work is underway for Elkins Park West, the commercial district adjacent to the Church and Old York Roads intersection. Construction of all streetscape enhancement projects is contingent upon grant funding.
